

This book examines the issue of private health clinics in Canada following the same format as the book above. The historical context of health clinics is covered along with likely future developments in this area. Students can gather information to support their inquiries and debate both sides of the issue. Williams, Laura E., and Craig Orback. <i>The Can Man.</i> New York: Lee & Low, 2010. Print.  In <i>The Can Man,</i> a boy wants to earn money to buy a new skateboard. He watches a homeless man collect cans for cash, and decides to do the same. The realistic paintings in the story help students to identify some issues inherent in homelessness. It also demonstrates how even small acts of kindness and humanity can make a difference to someone in a difficult situation. This book can spark a knowledge building circle to develop questions and potential actions to combat local social issues.	B 2.1

One such profile includes a focus on a Canadian youth named Ryan Hreljac who worked to bring clean drinking water and wells to those who don't have access. This book could be used to gather information on how to be an active global citizen. 	This is the true story of Shannen Koostachin, a Cree teenager from Northern Ontario. She and her classmates created a social justice campaign for greater equity in educational funding for children in First Nations communities. More specifically, she drew attention to Attawapiskat, Ontario advocating for children there to attend school in a safe and comfortable building, with a culturally relevant curriculum. The text brings some current issues of First Nations children to the attention of students, and demonstrates how even young Canadian citizens can take action. Further examination of current events around the opening of the new elementary school opened in Attawapiskat in August of 2014 is possible.
