

This non-fiction book explores the major battles of the War of 1812. Students can analyze and construct their own maps of the major battles using this book as guide. Possible questions to guide students include: <i>What do you notice about the location of the</i> <i>Major Battles of the War of 1812. Did the location benefit any</i> <i>particular side? Where were First Nations groups located in relation</i> <i>to the battles?</i> From the Documenting the War of 1812 series.

This non-fiction book explores the impact that the War of 1812 had on Canada then and now, the role of Nationalism and Canadian Identity. It also explores the impact that the War of 1812 had on various groups of people, including First Nations, the British, the French, Americans and more. Students can use this resource to research and explore the positive and negative effects the War of 1812 had on various groups of people during that time.From the Documenting the War of 1812 series. Students can be assigned a specific person and explain the historical significance of that person during the War of 1812. From the Documenting the War of 1812 series.

A historical fiction novel, about an Ojibwe family who lose their land, that can be used both in History and Language. Students will be able to investigate, interpret and analyze the interactions between First Nations people and Europeans from a First Nations perspective. Teachers' can use as a read-aloud or students can use in a Literature Circle to look at different historical perspectives.	
Laxer, James, and Richard Rudnicki. <i>Tecumseh</i> . Toronto: Groundwood Books/House of Anansi Press, 2012. Print. A picture book that tells the story of Tecumseh's life, including his role in the War of 1812. The book explains his alliance with the British and General Brock.
